Across the Spooniverse, a New Exhibition at Mingei International Museum, Stirs Up Imagery of Family, Celebration, and Tradition

Through more than 100 spoons, the showcase explores human creativity across regions and eras

Opens April 12, 2025

March 4, 2025, SAN DIEGO, CA — Around the world, spoons are essential implements that help us scoop, stir, mash, skim, cook, and eat. Some spoons come straight from nature—a gourd cut in half with its own built-in handle, for example, or a curved seashell. Others are carved of wood, bone, or horn, and some are made of fired clay, or hammered or cast metal. *Across the Spooniverse*, opening at Mingei International Museum on April 12, 2025, presents over 100 spoons from across different eras and world regions, including examples from Africa, Asia, Europe, and the Americas.

"Through exhibitions like our 2024 show, Cups to Connections, and now Across the Spooniverse, we reveal how everyday objects carry a shared significance across cultures," said **Jessica Hanson York**, executive director and CEO. "Generous hospitality and the community found in sharing a meal are universal experiences."

As objects of use, spoons are universally understood. Across the Spooniverse explores how each object is a reflection of a specific cultural context–from intimate traditions of home and family to community and celebratory preparations of food and drink and the spiritual gestures of giving thanks for sustenance.

Because of their role in the preparation and serving of food and drink, spoons are often cultural symbols of abundance and generosity. Sometimes the act of stirring, serving, or ladling is spiritually sacred. These spoons can bear visual references to the concept of blessing or a connection to the divine source of nourishment.

"These objects are both functional and brilliantly artful," said **Dr. Emily G. Hanna**, director of exhibitions and chief curator. "They symbolize concepts of abundance, generosity, and exchange. A spoon is so much more than a spoon!"

The design of each spoon reflects the work of a maker, a person often unknown to us, whose creativity inspires a sense of wonder. Some spoons on view in this exhibition are adorned with exquisite carvings of human and animal figures, while others are brilliant for their simplicity of form. Some show decades or even centuries of wear and use, and others are pristine. Contemporary spoon designs include an array of forms and materials, ranging from cast resin to mass-produced flatware hand-adorned with beads or precious stones.

This exhibition features spoons from Mingei's permanent collection, a selection of traditional spoons from the collection of Susan and Richard Ulevitch, and works by contemporary artists Erica Moody, Adam John Manley, and others.
